## FINISHING

### Joining

Using the photos and the layout chart as guides, lay patches in position.

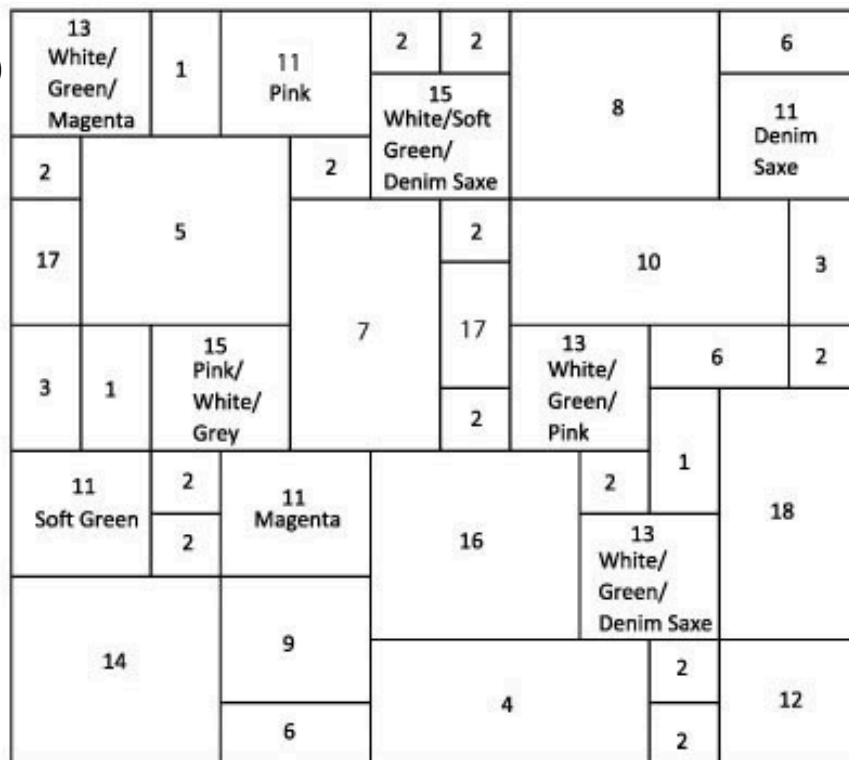
Where 2 small granny squares need to be joined to each other, whip st them together through the back loops only first.

Take two patches, with RS facing, attach White with ss to first corner.

Using 6mm hook and working through back loops only, ss across to join the patches.

Not all patches will have the same number of sts along a joined edge, so pin together first and adjust where to work the ss to join as you go, so that the edges lay as flat as they can. Continue joining patches in this way until all patches are joined.

1. Turnip Patch (10cm x 20cm)
2. Granny Square Patch (10cm x 10cm)
3. Carrot Patch Small (10cm x 20cm)
4. Carrot Patch Large (40cm x 20cm)
5. Bobble Patch (30cm x 30cm)
6. Sheep Patch Small (10cm x 20cm)
7. Sheep Patch Large (20cm x 40cm)
8. Harvest Patch (30cm x 30cm)
9. Duck Patch Small (20cm x 20cm)
10. Duck Patch Large (40cm x 20cm)
11. Berry Patch (20cm x 20cm)
12. Chicken Patch (20cm x 20cm)
13. Tulip Patch Small (20cm x 20cm)
14. Tulip Patch Large (30cm x 30cm)
15. Gingham Patch Small (20cm x 20cm)
16. Gingham Patch Large (30cm x 30cm)
17. Granny Stripe Patch Small (10cm x 20cm)
18. Granny Stripe Patch Large (20cm x 40cm)

## Edging

Attach White with ss to top right hand blanket corner.

### Rnd 1 (RS)

1ch, 1dc in each st across (approx. 137 dc), 1ch, turn to work down the left side, 1dc in each st (approx. 161 dc), 1ch, 1dc in each st across blanket bottom (approx. 137 dc), 1ch, turn to work up the right side, 1dc in each st (approx. 161 dc), ss to first dc to join. [approx. 596 dc, does not have to be exact]

### Rnd 2

1ch, work 1dc in each st around, and (1dc, 1ch, 1dc) in each corner space, ss to first st to join. [604 dc]

Fasten off and weave in ends.
